Jenifer notes that: “It is impossible to write a novel of English life in which the class system does not play a major role. But class as it exists in England is virtually unique and it is especially difficult for people who have spent their entire lives in North America to appreciate its nuances and to take them seriously.” Jenifer will help us to understand the importance and impact of the English class system on Jane Austen’s world.

Pride and Prejudice wins Radio 4 poll of women's fiction

It is a truth universally acknowledged that the book women feel has most transformed their lives is the one that has assured them for the past two centuries that, yes, they will marry the wealthy, handsome man next door and live happily ever after.

Pride and Prejudice, Jane Austen's salty-tongued commentary on the plight of women in the 19th century, perhaps best known today for providing Colin Firth with the opportunity to pose in a wet shirt in front of many grateful viewers, has won the Women's Watershed Fiction poll, it was announced yesterday on Radio 4's Woman's Hour. Despite being specifically about women's lives 200 years ago, the relevance of Austen's classic has not diminished, according to the 14,000 voters who took part in the poll, 93% of whom were women. It is, according to the poll, the novel that "has spoken to you on a personal level; it may have changed the way you look at yourself, or simply made you happy to be a woman" The runners-up #2.
